OCTOBER EVENT: Norwegian Day, Norse, TX, Saturday, October 8, 9:45am

This Texas history trip will take us to the unincorporated community known as Norse. Once numbering thousands, only about 100 widely-dispersed people remain in this community today.

We will have a country buffet lunch at Johnny's Place in Clifton (pay for your own lunch), have a brief stop at the historic Ringness House Museum, and then visit two beautifully preserved, historic churches. The restored Ringness House was the home of early Norwegian pioneers Jens and Kari Ringness. It was the site of many worship services held by the early pioneers before they established the congregation of Our Savior Lutheran Church. This church, also known as the Old Norse Church, is still in regular use today. We will also see the grave of Cleng Peerson, "The Father of Norwegian Immigration", who is buried in the Norse Cemetery adjacent to the church. Due to the community's strong ties to its original Norwegian heritage, this area was visited by King Olav V of Norway in 1982 to commemorate the 200th anniversary of Cleng Peerson's birth. The second structure is the newer but arguably more famous St. Olaf's Kirke, also known as the Old Rock Church. The church was built to accommodate the movement of settlers west, but is no longer in regular use due to the demise of its congregation. St. Olaf's also has a beautiful adjoining cemetery which we will explore.

When: Saturday, October 8, 9:45. We will have a briefing on the event then hit the road.

Where: We will meet at the Starbucks at 7429 Oakmont Blvd, Fort Worth. See map below.

Signup and Cost: We will charge an event fee of \$5 per person for each MBCA member and their immediate family members. Non-members are welcome, and will be charged \$10 each. The event fee will cover planning expenses and other sundries. Pay for your own lunch. There is no charge for admission to the Ringness House and to the churches, but donations will be appreciated.

1) To pay the event fee online using your credit card:



Prior Event Report - Texas History Tour - Thurber! Mingus, TX, May 21, 2022

Twenty members in eleven cars joined us for a great drive to Mingus, a delicious lunch at New York Hill restaurant, and to see what remains of the town of Thurber.

The town was wholly owned by The Texas and Pacific Coal Company. Now a ghost town, Thurber was a major brick and coal center during its heyday in 1918-1920, attracting a population of some 10,000 from eighteen nationalities. The town was dismantled in the mid-1930s when oil supplanted coal as fuel for locomotives.

We had a very nice drive on a scenic, twisty and hilly route, leaving behind the relatively crowded cities south of Fort Worth. We enjoyed a good home-cooked lunch in a private room at New York Hill restaurant, named for the fancy neighborhood of managers hired from the east coast at the base of the hill. The restaurant also offers a panoramic view of downtown Thurber and seeks to preserve its history. After lunch, We briefly checked out the smokestack, the only remnant of the Thurber power plant which made the town one of the earliest to be electrified in the USA.

Finally, we explored the historic Thurber cemetery to see some interesting graves of unusual and/or prominent citizens buried there.

Twenty-five folks in thirteen cars joined us for a great country drive, a hearty breakfast at the sprawling Rough Creek Lodge, and wine-tasting at Bluff Dale Winery, located at the gateway of the North Texas Hill Country. Having this event was questionable for a while due to the Chalk Mountain Wildfire in the area, but fire maps and calls to local officials confirmed our routes were clear. The event happened as scheduled.

Rough Creek Lodge and Resort is famous for its great restaurant, hunting and fishing, great family vacations, and as a venue for world-class corporate conferences and retreats on its 11,000 acres in the middle of nowhere. We enjoyed a hearty breakfast buffet at the restaurant.

After breakfast, we made our way to Bluff Dale Winery for a tasting of 5 highly-rated wines and great views of the valley from their deck. The massive windows of the building offered magnificent views of the Dallas skyline.
